

4,81,445 women served through IDF interventions

Comprehensive Abortion Care



780 doctors trained as CAC providers from 720 facilities

72% of newly trained providers eligible for the first time to provide CAC services

In FY18, IDF continued efforts to improve women's access to comprehensive abortion care (CAC) in 11 states, and strengthened our comprehensive contraceptive care (CCC) project with expansion to two new states, for a total of four states. Our work in these states involved strengthening the public health system; equipping health facilities to offer quality CAC and contraception services; training doctors and supporting them to offer CAC and contraception services; and improving the quality of services.

Through focused communitylevel efforts, we continued to improve access to sexual and reproductive health (SRH) services for young women.



Other FY18 Highlights



Expanding contraceptive choices and building state-level institutional capacities

We partnered with state governments of Assam and West Bengal and expanded our contraception program in two new states. Our objective is to build capacities at the facility, district, and state levels to plan and conduct contraception trainings within the public health system leading to continued availability of high-quality contraception services in the two states.

Research to improve contraceptive uptake

In partnership with **Population Services** International India and Population Council, we initiated a research project to develop scalable and effective solutions for increasing uptake and continuation of postpregnancy contraception. The project is being implemented in two districts, Lucknow and Agra, in Uttar Pradesh



Expanding the discourse on CAC

We conducted the second CAC Conclave in July 2017 in New Delhi. The two-day Conclave is part of a series of events aimed at creating a wider community of stakeholders for CAC in India. The conclave brought together over 73 participants from diverse backgrounds – academics, NGO representatives, researchers, lawyers, service providers, donors, students, and media persons to share their experience of improving women's health and lives by increasing access to CAC.




Other FY18 Highlights

New contraceptives in the public sector

IDF provided technical assistance to government of Madhya Pradesh to launch two new contraceptives in the public sector at a state-level meeting. The contraceptives -



injectable hormone, Antara programme; and weekly oral contraceptive pills, Chhaya were launched in the presence of Shri Rustam Singh (IPS) Honourable Health Minister-MP and Shri Sharad Jain, Honourable State Health Minister – MP.



Resource for Medical Providers

In collaboration with the Centre for Health Law, Ethics and Technology, Jindal Global Law School, we developed a policy brief that aims to provide clarity on the provisions of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012 and the Medical Termination of Pregnancy (MTP) Act, 1971 with specific reference to young women's access to safe abortion services.





Recognition of IDF's organizational culture

IDF was recognized as one of the 10 best NGOs in India to work for in 2017 by the Great Place to Work® institute. We significantly advanced in the 2018 ranking, with IDF being now recognized among the top 50 Great Mid-Size (for- and not-for-profit) workplaces in the country. 
